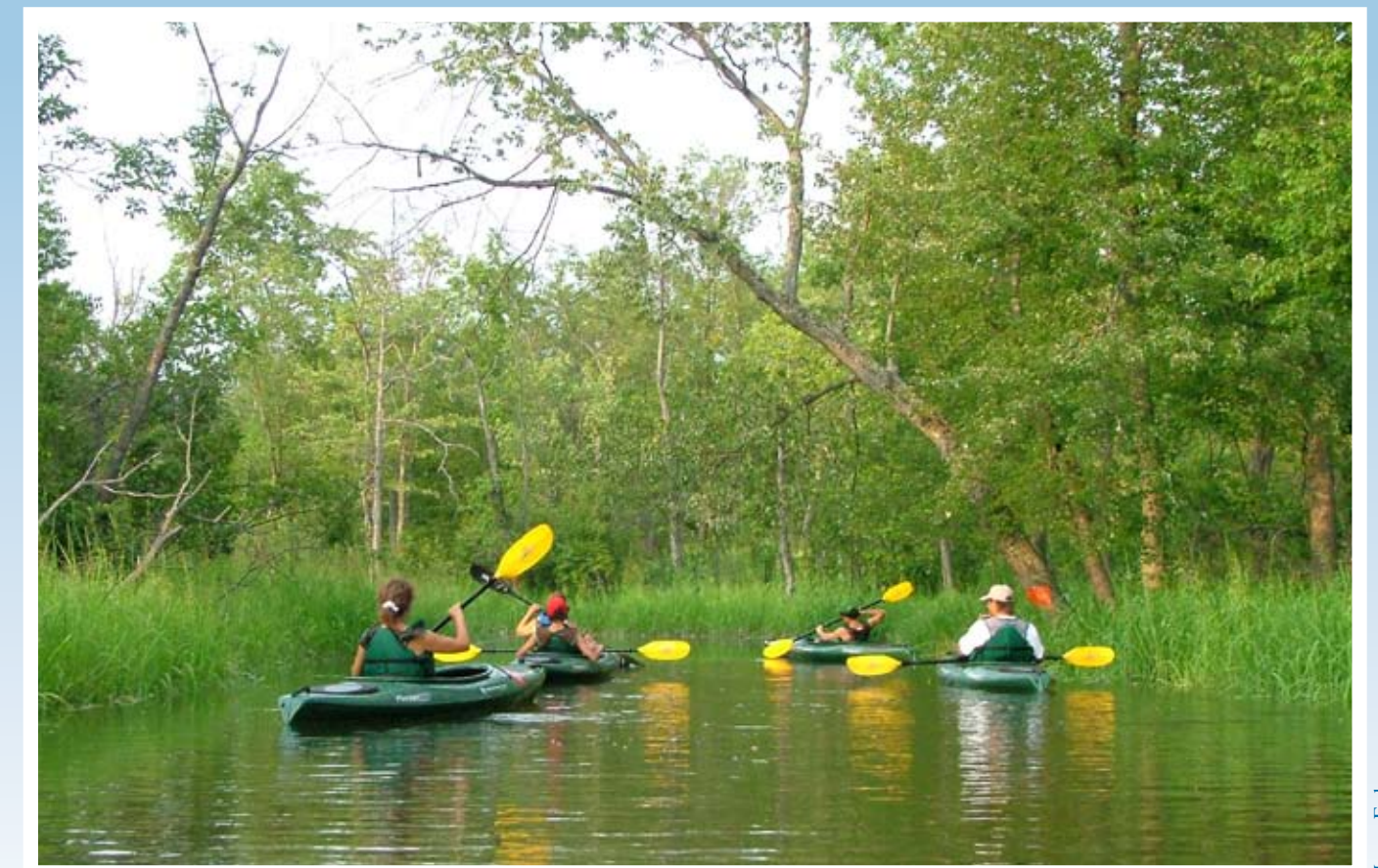


SCENIC & NATURAL TREASURES

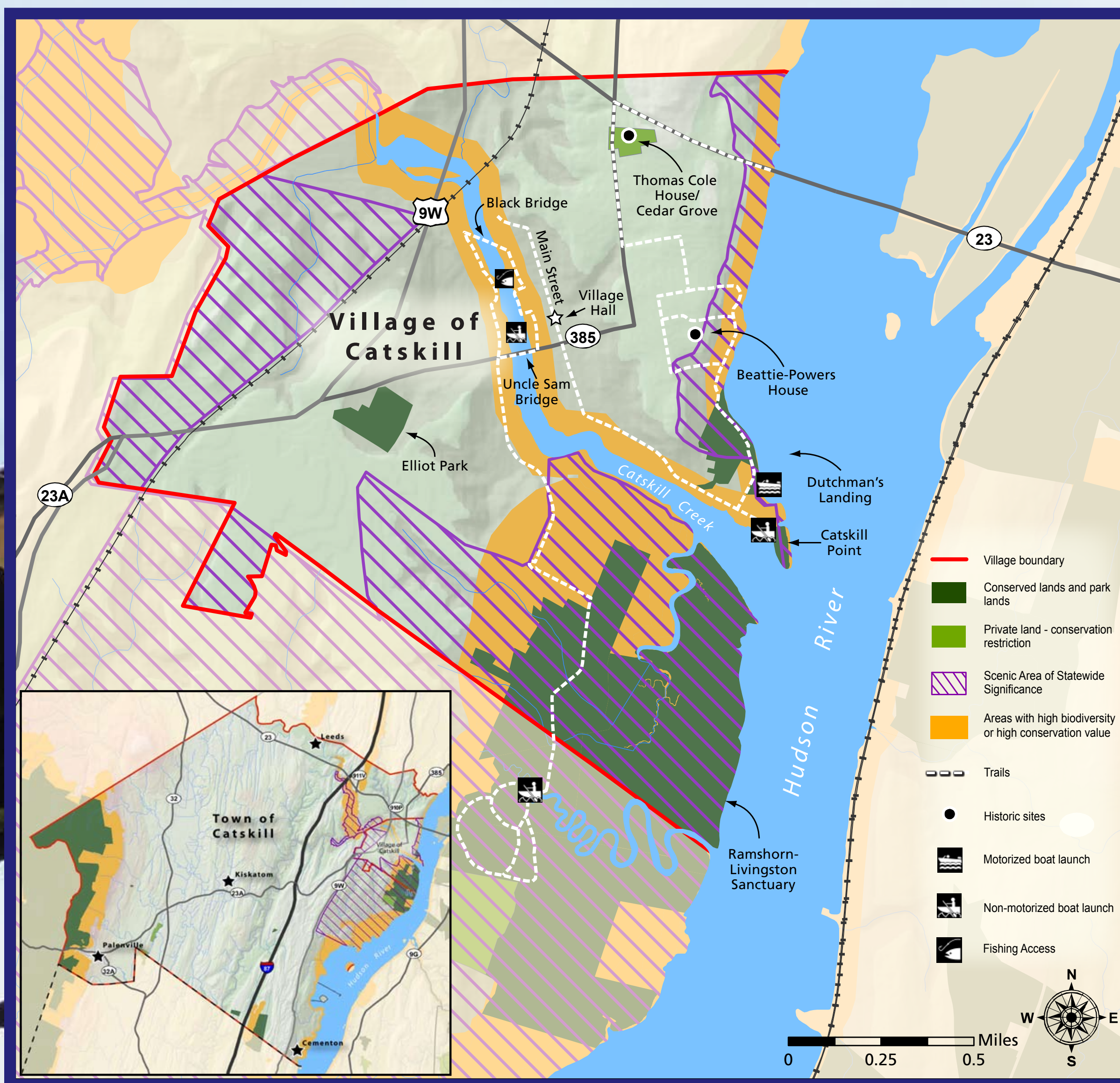

- Historic buildings along **Main Street** are filled with restaurants, shops and galleries that contribute to the village's economic vitality. Marinas on Catskill Creek offer critical access for boaters to come ashore and frequent Main Street businesses, a short walk away.
- Catskill is blessed with two riverfront parks. **Dutchman's Landing** features barbeque pits, picnic tables, a playground and a boat launch. **Catskill Point Park** is a destination for fishing and enjoying great river views, while its historic warehouse is a venue for festivals and arts events.
- Ramshorn-Livingston Sanctuary**, part of the Hudson's largest freshwater tidal swamp, sustains bald eagles and some of the region's largest concentrations of migrating waterfowl. Its popular features include 3.5 miles of trails, a bird-observation platform and a kayak-canoe launch.
- Cedar Grove**, the restored home and studio of renowned painter Thomas Cole, is an essential stop on the **Hudson River School Art Trail** and **Catskill Walking Tour**. The nearby **Beattie Powers House**, an 1839 Greek Revival villa, today hosts many community events.
